Welcome back to Coffee in the Swarm, a Project Zion Podcast production coming to you from Graceland University in Lamoni, Iowa. The Swarm is our on-campus snack bar in the Newcom Student Union. This year our podcast is co-hosted by campus chaplains Levi Triplett and myself Aliyah Farrell, and it's hosted by campus minister, Mike Hoffman. Coffee in the Swarm is where we interview students at Graceland who are connected to the Community of Christ. Today we are with our second guest speaker, Katie Bover. Okay, tell us about yourself. Tell us your story.

Hi, I'm Katie. Um, my story, I don't know. Um, I grew up in Independence, Missouri, in around the Kansas City area, I've been there my entire life. And then I've been at Graceland all four years so far.

Katie Bover 01:15 I went to high school at Truman High School.

And how was that experience living in Independence?

Pretty good. Um, I, I liked school for the most part, like throughout, but I liked the area because I was really close to a lot of my family that I was close with. And then being in Independence and being surrounded by like, so many Community of Christ congregations. I had a really fun experience, like growing up with the youth in church just because we had so much around us.

So did you ever visit the other Graceland campus in Independence?

Katie Bover 01:52

I've been there once or twice before, but not a whole lot. Just because it is like the a lot of the nursing and then some of the master's programs. So I haven't actually been on the campus a lot. But for a couple of years there on my way to school, I drove by it every morning, so I know exactly where it is.

I was just asking for the sake of like, my own curiosity. I'm doing nursing. (Nice.) So moving on. Tell us about your year major and your house.

So I'm a senior. This is actually my last semester. I'm graduating in December. My house is Sariah. And I've been on Sariah all four years. So that's been a lot of fun.

Katie Bover 02:33 Yes. Yeah, we get to be together.

Aliyah Farrell 02:36 Yeah, she didn't come to house meeting last night.

Oh. We don't talk about that. I'm there most of the time. Um, but yeah, so I've been on Sariah, which has been really good. And my major is Allied Health and Human Movement Science.

Aliyah Farrell 02:53 What influenced you to want to do Allied Health Science?

Katie Bover 02:56

I'd say a lot of it was I knew I wanted to do something in the medical field. I knew I didn't really want to be like a doctor or a nurse. I knew like there's so many other careers out there. I didn't know a whole lot about them, but I kind of knew I wanted to do something in that. And I was able to actually get some experience through family members who my grandma when she was sick, like for a while before she passed away. And she had a lot of therapists who would come to her house. She had like PT, OT, stuff like that would come. And so I got really interested like by watching them work with her. And then I had the opportunity the next year in school to do an Allied Health Program, which was, the entire purpose of the class was exploring literally every occupation that's not a doctor or nurse. So I got to learn kind of about everything out there, which was a lot of fun. (in high school?.) High school. Yeah. So, it was a half-day program in Lee's Summit called Summit Tech. And it's they have a lot of, they had like a nursing program and allied health. They have a lot of stuff in engineering, and they work with all the schools in the Kansas City Metro.

Did Graceland have its Allied Health when you first got here.?

Yes, it was only a couple years old.

I knew it started after I got here.

Yeah, it was, I don't remember when in high school it started. It started sometime in high school. Yeah, because I remember when I first got I was early high school, they didn't really have that. And then kind of right around when I started looking for schools and actually getting really into it as well when they started. So okay.

Okay, and then what was church like for you back in Independence?

Katie Bover 04:34

So I've been surrounded by Community of Christ my entire life. I grew up going to East Alton, which was a congregation in Independence (It's closed now, right.) Yeah. So we closed down the very, very beginning of 2020 right before COVID and everything.

So it really wasn't related to COVID, the closing?

No, it was it was a really long process. We had been talking about it for probably, seriously for probably a year and a half or two. A lot of it was due to just the building we were in. It was not, it was taking lots and lots of money to keep up. And the repairs we were doing weren't really sticking. And it just wasn't a sustainable, you know, we're gonna lose a lot more money trying to fix it every couple of years. And...

So was it closed before you came to Graceland?

Katie Bover 05:24

Yeah, so it actually closed the week before the pandemic started. Oh, so yeah.

And when did you come to what was your first year?

Katie Bover 05:30

It was fall of 2020. Okay, so yeah, so East Alton closed like, February it was either late February, early March of 2020. And then that was the, that was the pandemic. And then I graduated in May of 2020. And I started here, August of 2020.

So what brought you to Graceland?

Katie Bover 05:53

Just kind of the same thing, how I've been surrounded by Community of Christ my whole life. I kind of have always known about Graceland. I didn't know about specifics of it till I was older. But I I'm a lot of people in my family went to Graceland. So I grew up kind of hearing the name. And then I have family here in Lamoni, and they actually live right across from founders.

So that's your grandparents, right?

It's my it's my mom's. Yeah, it's my mom's aunt and uncle's Right. Um, but we would come up here probably a couple times a year to visit. So, just visiting their house, I would see Graceland and especially as a little kid, it was fun to be like, right across from the whole campus and see everything. So I kind of always just knew about it, heard about it. And then when I got older, and especially in high school, I went to SPEC every year that I could, which was a ton of fun. And so between that, and then just being in Independence, so it was always Graceland reps at events I was going to and stuff like that. So as I went throughout high school and learn more about it, I really liked the way our Student Life was set up. And just some of the really unique experiences that Graceland provides, in terms of just student life and activities and opportunities that you get. And then like I said earlier, right in the middle of my high school, when I was starting to kind of figure this out, is when they started their allied health program. And so once that kind of got started, I was like, this is perfect. That's a good program for me. And I liked all that other stuff, too.

Yeah. And then they kind of like piggyback off of that, like, just like, tell us about your Graceland experience thus far and how you've been doing.

Yeah, I've loved it. It's been a ton of fun. My freshman year was, was really weird, because that was still the very beginning of the pandemic. That was still before vaccines before all of that. And so especially that first semester, I guess, really, the whole year, we weren't really having many events on campus, it was still masks, masks everywhere. There wasn't people hanging out in the student union, anything like that. So I'd say my freshman year was definitely a little weird. And as a freshman who has and had a lot of social anxiety, my freshman year was kind of a lot of just kind of sticking to myself. My group of friends were all on Sariah. So it was a lot of just us hanging out on the hall, not doing a whole lot. And then my sophomore year, when stuff started opening back up, we were still really cautious and went by COVID like protocols, there was a couple times we mass went back on for a while off, but the campus was pretty much back to normal in terms of events we were having and stuff. So, it's in my sophomore years, really, when I was able to get involved with a lot of like the clubs and things that I do and really my sophomore years when I kind of found my place.

Yeah. And what has been your like your really church experience here at Graceland?

Yeah, so my freshman year, like I said, I didn't really do a whole lot. Campus Ministries had some events. I didn't go I went to a couple of them, but not very many. And my sophomore year, I wanted to be on Sariah's House Council. And when we were looking at positions and stuff, chaplain was the one that I was most interested in. I liked the idea of getting more involved in the church life, but also just, I've always really liked to be that person that like people can go to if they need anything. And I see a lot of that in Chaplain too. And so that's the one I ran for. That's the one I did. So sophomore year as a house chaplain. And so I was able to do a lot of those events. And then I ended up really falling in love with it. I loved the connection to church that I had missed the year before. I don't think I'd realized how much I missed it. And I just really loved the group of people. It was very much a group of people that I felt like I belonged in and I loved. I just loved the whole experience. And so then going into my junior year, I wanted to stay involved in campus ministries and so I became the Safe Ride and Safe Walk Coordinator. We had just started the program up the semester before that, so it was still kind of new, we're still kind of figuring it out. So that's what I did last year. That was my, my technical job. But I kind of helped with a bunch of random stuff throughout campus ministries like services and stuff like that.

Could you explain Safe Ride and Safe Walk little bit more? Because I don't know that all of our listeners would know.

Katie Bover 10:19

No, yeah, no, I didn't think about that. So it's basically just a campus safety program. It is, on weekdays, every weekday except Tuesday, we are running from eight o'clock to midnight. And there's four people here in the office. And if anyone doesn't feel safe walking on campus in the dark, or anything like that, there's a lot of random spots on campus that get really dark, and things like that. So, if someone doesn't want to walk by themselves, they call in and then to have our employees, go meet them wherever they're at, and walk them wherever they're going. So that was that was just an easy way to have somebody else by you walking at night. And then Safe Ride is probably like the bigger part of it at the moment that one is Friday and Saturday nights. And we get one of the Graceland issued vehicles, and we run from 10pm to 2am. And anyone, wherever they are in Lamoni, can call and get a ride back to campus, no questions asked. Just a free ride. You don't have to tell us what you're doing or why, we'll just go pick you up wherever you are in Lamoni and bring you back to campus. And then something we've just started this semester too is doing rides for people who don't have their own transportation. So if you have like a doctor's appointment in Des Moines, or you have to go to the Des Moines airport to either leave or get picked up. If we can find someone to cover that ride. We've been doing some of those too.

Yeah. That's been quite a challenge, though, for (Yes.) Finding times when people are available to drive when students need them. So...

Yeah, that was still the new part. So we're still figuring that one out.

Um, so earlier, we were talking about how you're graduating? (Yes.) Spring. So can you just tell us a little bit about your plans, like after you graduate?

Yeah, so um, like I said, this is my last semester. So I'm graduating in December. And then I will just be living at home in Independence, just kind of working through the spring semester, taking a year break before grad school. So I'll just be at home working. I'm sure I'll come up here and visit a lot, because a lot of my friends are still up here. And I'm only two hours away. So you'll see me up here in the spring. But yeah, so I'll just kind of be taking a break. And then I will hopefully be starting grad school in May. So I don't know exactly where I'll end up right now. But hopefully all it all goes according to plan. I'll be starting grad school in May.

Yeah. So I want to do physical therapy. So just working with him, like human movement, things like that. And my, specifically I want to go into pediatrics, I've always really loved kids. I've always kind of that's been a part of my personality that everyone around me has known since I was still a kid. I've always just really gravitated towards children and love working with them. And as I've shadowed a lot of different kind of specialties in physical therapy I've done like hospital, outpatient, pediatrics, stuff like that. And that kind of just confirmed it for me. I loved the days that I was doing pediatrics. It was, I liked everything that I did. But that one just I really loved those days. And so I want to work with kids. So it'll probably be a lot of kids with either like developmental delays, birth defects, kind of like those, those kinds of things.
