Robin Linkhart 00:26

Hello and welcome to What's Brewing a Project Zion Podcast series where we explore the question, "What is mission? And why does it matter?" I'm your host, Robin Linkhart. And I'm here today with Humberto Tinsman and Jacob Ross, the founders and co- hosts of a new podcast, Ministry for Dummies. Welcome, Humberto.and Jacob. It is great to have you with us today on Project Zion Podcast.

Jacob Ross 00:56 It's great to be with you.

Humberto Tinsman 00:57 It's great to be here. Thank you for having us, Robin.

Jacob Ross 00:59 Absolutely.

Robin Linkhart 01:01

So Humberto, we know you've been a guest on Project Zion a few times before, but this is Jacob's first time. And I always like to take a few minutes for introductions, no matter how many times you've been on Project Zion. So please tell us a little bit about you. Jacob, let's start with you.

Jacob Ross 01:19

So, as Robin alluded to, my name is Jacob Ross. I am from Houston, Texas now, originally from Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, and then by way of Ames, Iowa and Graceland. I ended up in Houston. And so now I work here in Houston. I'm at work in the electronic procurement space. And I just enjoy, you know, sweating away my life for three months of the year. And then I get to enjoy these winter months where it's, you know, 50 degrees and sunny. So that's me. I'm very cool. Yeah.

Humberto Tinsman 01:56

Well, welcome, everyone. My name is Humberto Tinsman. Coming to you live from Albuquerque, New Mexico. I work for the Rio Grande Mission Center as a Mission Center minister, and as a co-pastor of the Albuquerque congregation. Like Jacob, I also went to Graceland University. But I come from the

great state of Missouri, and then got really sick and tired of Midwest winters and said, "Yes, please," to the southwest. So we're really happy to be here.

Robin Linkhart 02:26

Well, thanks again for being with us. Now, this past year or so I have been hearing bits and pieces from my good friend and colleague, your Apostle Dave Nii, about your idea to start a podcast. And in June 2023, you posted your first episode, introducing Ministry for Dummies, which quote from your website, "A podcast hosted by two friends who have a shared passion for service and our church. We meet to explore our faith journey and where we feel we are being led". So before we get into the story of how you hatched this idea, and the specific steps you took to launch, talk a little bit about your passion for service and for our church, Community of Christ. Take it away.

Humberto Tinsman 03:17

Do you wanna go first, or me?

Jacob Ross 03:21

Yeah, I'll go first. So as I'm, this will be a common theme with Humberto because we have talked about this before. We were both born into the church, right? Our families were in the church. So we've just kind of been around our whole lives, not kind of, we have been around the church our whole lives. And so as we went to college, I went to Iowa State first and then transferred to Graceland. Right? So I always stayed active. And I was always engaged. So I played the piano. So growing up, I play the hymns for church and stuff like that, right? So I was always engaged. And eventually we ended up meeting each other and doing a church internship at Stone Church in independence. And so that's kind of where our lives and also passion for the church kind of intersected.

Humberto Tinsman 04:12

Yeah, so like Jacob said, Yah, we both we met at Graceland. We didn't know each other before that time, and then our junior year or going into our junior year that sophomore year summer, we both did an internship for the Stone Church, Community of Christ congregation, and Jacob and I realized that we are really great friends, but we almost killed each other as roommates. But, you know, after that year, you know, our paths just continued to intertwine and, you know, then we became, you know, continue to be great friends, but I think like Jacob said, you know, I was raised in the church, and my first real job was as a lifeguard at the Ozark campgrounds. So, you know, started out working for the church. just kind of seeing, you know, the things behind the scenes and I that has always been something that has attracted me of building spaces for people to enjoy ministry. And yeah the podcast is definitely something that has come from that passion of wanting to build spaces where people can feel loved, where people can ask questions and where people can explore what is this thing called Community of Christ and how it can not just change lives, but changes the entire world.

Robin Linkhart 05:30

I love that. And I really appreciate two young men who grew up in a Peace Church almost kill themselves, each other, kill each other as roommates.

Jacob Ross 05:39

It doesn't really do it justice because it doesn't. And we live together that summer we live there were three of us in a one bedroom apartment. So we were sleeping on like twin beds, and all crammed in one small bedroom. And then all, I left a couple weeks early to go on a family vacation. And I unintentionally left a container of Chinese food in the back of our fridge, which then dripped down the back of the fridge and got really moldy and spoiled in the bottom of the fridge. And so then I was gone. And Humberto and Nick who is our third roommate had to clean out the fridge.

Humberto Tinsman 06:23

So shout out shout out to Nick Keeler, because out of the three of us, he was truly the peacemaker of that experience. But yeah, I did. I did almost fly to Europe, because that was the only thing Jacob left our internship to go to Europe. And so I did almost kill him when he came back on campus because of scrubbing out that nasty fridge. But definitely shout out to Ken McLean and the Stone Church community. It was an amazing experience. And like we said, you know, yeah, we wanted to kill each other by the end of it. But we also left that internship going, Okay, this is now one of my best friends for my entire life. Yeah,

Robin Linkhart 07:00

I love it. Building community is arduous and even painful at times. And it's to say it's life changing and transforming. All righty, so now tell us specifically about your journey to becoming co hosts of an up and coming podcasts and spare no details, please.

Humberto Tinsman 07:22

Yeah, so I'm really where the idea kind of came from was from an online ministry that we host for the Rio Grande Mission Center, but also kind of the Southern USA Mission Field called Coffee Talk. And Coffee Talk is just an online gathering where young adults can come together, do check ins, check in on each other and kind of share where they are in their journey. But the downside of that ministry, like all ministries was if you can't come to when we're meeting, you can't participate in it. And, you know, I reached out to Jacob and said, you know, what if? What if we did a podcast because Jacob had done previous podcast before, and I knew that was something that he was good at. And I think we both were looking for a way to engage with younger adults, but also just any one from walk of life and kind of share that, you know, as we kind of talked about, ministry is arduous, and we want it to be raw and real and say, Hey, this is what we're doing. This is what we are trying to figure out. I don't know if Jacob said it, but he's also a co pastor for the Houston congregation. So we are both in the pastorate fields. And you learn a lot when you're trying to lead not just a congregation, but make an impact in a local community. So we want to share with the rest of the church what that experience was like, because we know there are other pastors out there who sometimes feel like, okay, I'm alone, or I have no idea what I'm doing. And you know, I want to hear some other voices. And yeah, that just kind of blossomed into ministry for dummies.

Jacob Ross 08:57

Yeah, and when we were at Graceland together, Humberto and I touched on this idea of doing a Graceland sports podcast. There's obviously nobody in that space. But then at the end of the day, I mean, you want to talk about just depressing topics I have to do a podcast about. Graceland athletics,

circa 2019. I mean, I saw two football wins the entire time, I was a student. So like, you know, we went for more uplifting ministry than I guess what we initially discussed.

Humberto Tinsman 09:31 Yeah, exactly.

Jacob Ross 09:33 Thank goodness.

Humberto Tinsman 09:34 Yeah.

Robin Linkhart 09:37

So what were the nuts and bolts steps of launching a new podcast?

Jacob Ross 09:41

So I was somewhat familiar with it because I had been doing a podcast with my fiancé like just a sports podcast. So I knew like okay, well, Spotify Well, at the time, Anchor FM was free. You could upload it and as long as your podcasts had like less than 100,000 listens over like x period of time, it was free. Sounds like oh, this is easy, like all Humberto and I have to do is meet on Zoom. And as long as one of us has access to like a Zoom premium account, we can just record that meeting. And then I can also record the input on my computer. And we can upload it. And it's just like, oh, this is this is simple. It's all free. So everything we do is it's completely free to us. And, you know, we registered a website domain, which was somehow free, right, so ministryfordummies.org. Nobody had done a podcast called Ministry for Dummies, which was surprising to me. To both of us, really. And and so we just kind of dumb lucked our way through it ended up like, it was it was all it all just fell into place for us.

Humberto Tinsman 10:59

Yeah, definitely, you know. So Jacob was definitely more of the technical nuts and bolts side of it. And I was the one who had to, I don't I don't want to say, chagrin, or hoodwink, but just go and plead my case in front of Dave Nii, and said, "Hey, I promise it's a great idea." "What are you gonna call it?" "Ministry for Dummies." And the fact that Dave did not laugh me out of the Zoom meeting, I think is a better testimony to how great Dave is and how supportive he is of local ministries. But we talked about, you know, hey, we see him, we see a place that, you know, Project Zion does such a great job, for what it is. And in is such an amazing podcast, but we want to put our own spin on it, we want to be funny, and we want to joke and we want to, you know, be our authentic selves. Because, you know, again, we thought people would want to listen to that. And the thing that has just kind of blown us away has been the positive response. And, you know, we always kind of we say that throughout a lot of episodes. Okay, Dave hasn't shut us down yet. So we're doing another episode. So we're gonna get it in before for for anyone hears it. So but it's just been wonderful to do. And I definitely think it has added a another elements to Jacob and I's friendship, as we've worked on this project together.

Jacob Ross 12:14

Yeah. And in our initial conversation, it was like, well, we're gonna do it like either way. So this is kind of it's a, we're not really asking for permission. We're just giving you a heads up. So that was, that was kind of how that that went down.

Humberto Tinsman 12:32

Humberto was asking for permission, Jacob was going to do it no matter what.was

Jacob Ross 12:35 Yeah, I was going to do it no matter what, I did not care.

Robin Linkhart 12:38

Good partnership.

Jacob Ross 12:39

The church doesn't sign my paychecks. So different there. Yeah.

Robin Linkhart 12:44

So you've talked a little bit about surprises along the way? What were some of the challenges you experienced, or unexpected things that happened?

Humberto Tinsman 12:54

Well, one of the first things was, I learned that I do need to get some microphone. We, our very first episode is atrocious, but we keep it up. Because, you know, we want people to see there is a progression, you know, so, you know, we talked about, you know, the building blocks of what it takes to do a podcast. Yes, my audio can always be clearer. And I'm always going to be pitchy because I'm going to blow it out, because I'm loud. But I'm using a \$10 Walmart microphone, you know, the they it is not a lot of fancy nuts and bolts that have gone into it. It was just, you know, hey, we have a story, we have a passion, and we want to share it. So that was something that we kind of had to learn, you know, checking our website and making sure that we're up to date on our question and answer forum. That has been something that has been amazing of how many responses and the stories that people have told us, you know, the, their, their great experiences with the church, where they want the church to move in the future, and just their legitimate questions of, "Hey, I've never had a forum that I can ask anything that I want. So what do you think of this?" And we've turned entire episodes into those questions, and, you know, sharing our own questions that we have on our Faith Journeys.

Jacob Ross 14:06

And, that's so beneficial to us. Because, I mean, one of the challenges that we have experiences, well, where are we going? Right, you know, what are we trying to do? You know, not that we, I think we're kind of shooting from the hip, initially, like, okay, these are some topics that come to mind. We're just gonna, you know, go go, go, go, and now it's like, okay, well, where, where's next? Are we doing you know, a long arc here. Are we going to explore topics in depth over multiple episodes? And so I think that one of the benefits of having a question and answer form has been, well, I mean, you know, just straight up. It's something for us to talk about that. You know, it's written for us, but also it's really

guided us. Like, okay, these are things we're hearing and how can we use this to guide us. I think that has really been positive as Humberto said and, and surprising..

Robin Linkhart 15:08

So you mentioned you were surprised nobody had already taken Ministry for Dummies and that you can get a free website kind of deal. And you could get this and that for free. Did you have any other surprises along the way,

Jacob Ross 15:20

We have some negative ones one time, we recorded an episode and my computer ran out of memory in the middle of it. And so we had to use the Zoom meeting recording. And so this is like on the back end, but I have like a nice mixing board. And I've good audio editing software. So I was, I'm able to kind of control the quality. And man, when we listened to that episode, it was tough. That was, it was really bad. And I had to go in and edit the Zoom meeting. Because on my computer, I can filter the inputs. So I'm able to like control Humberto sound differently. Man it was. It was something it was, that was definitely that was a challenge.

Humberto Tinsman 16:05

I'm a loud Latin man. That's who I am. So yeah, and any audio. You know, I've always been told I'm an audio technicians worst nightmare. So I again, again, my blessings, my love my support to the editors of Project Zion. For the one time the church had me go do a recorded sermon again. Oh, just they're amazing. Everyone behind the scenes is amazing.

Robin Linkhart 16:27

Yeah, sound can be a really big challenge. Not long ago, I was doing an interview and my granddaughter was here visiting, she was doing an overnight so she knew I was recording in my office, I had my sign up. She was down the hall. And I had loaned her my air pods. So I'm halfway in and all of a sudden her air pods link in to, to what's happening. And I'm like, oh, no, and I wasn't sure if Zoom would record like the data coming in without that interfering or not. So we had to stop and restart. And I went down and confiscated the air pods in a very diplomatic way. But anyway, you just never know what's gonna happen when you're live recording, right?

Jacob Ross 17:15

I think what, two episodes ago were interviewed Mike Hoffman and my cat kept jumping up on the table. And it was driving me nuts because he's a cat, right? Like, I can't do anything to stop it. I'm powerless. So yeah, it's just funny things like that happen.

Robin Linkhart 17:31

It is funny. So you mentioned that you've gotten some positive feedback. Tell us more about your feedback from your Mission Center and online. And maybe some surprising places that people have contacted you from. I know, but you have listeners all over the globe, and you just never know.

Humberto Tinsman 17:48

Yeah, the same for us. When we you know, Spotify and the Anchor, they give you kind of a readout of, you know, where your listeners are from. And when we saw international listens, we were blown away. I'm like, "How the heck did you know, discover our little piddly podcast?". But you know, some of the great responses have been, you know, "Hey, I'm a young adult in and I'm the only one in my congregation. And it's just great to hear voices from the church who are in their 20s and 30s. And are trying to figure it out." And you know, you know, they've said yes to ministry. And now they're trying to figure out what does that even mean? I'm saying, you know, yes to, to the journey, you know, and I think the thing that I have absolutely loved is just the good humor that everyone has. That's something that I think is a cornerstone of our relationships. I mean, we love to do we love to laugh, we love to make fun of ourselves and each other. And people have responded really, really positively to that. And that has been something great to experience. I also think the thing that has been surprising is how many of our youth from our youth groups listen to our podcast. And so they're always asking for shout outs and different things like that. So we always try to make sure that they feel welcomed and call to So yeah, just the just the difference of age ranges of the demographics that we've been able to touch have been amazing.

Robin Linkhart 19:18

Do you have anything to add to that, Jacob?

Jacob Ross 19:20

I think Humberto kind of nailed it. And right. We've, it is surprising. It is somewhat concerning, though, because I will say things on the podcast, right? I mean, it's as with anybody, right? Like I talk about things that are close to home. So whenever we come across a topic that like frustrates me about something my home congregation does, like, I know that in Sunday school, somebody's gonna ask me about it. So that's always fun. I in one of our episodes, I talked about the fact that our congregation is kids, me, and my fiancé and then it jumps all the way to 65 plus, and then the Sunday School teacher was like, "I don't know what We're talking about." Because she's, you know, in her 50s. And she was like I was she was joking, of course. But so like I was insulted, I cannot believe you would say I was over 65. So you know, it's just somebody's always listening, I guess.

Robin Linkhart 20:13

That's great to hear. I love hearing that youth are listening to your podcasts, that is fantastic. So tell us a little bit about the seven podcasts that you have on your site, and maybe a sneak preview of what you have lined up in the coming months.

Jacob Ross 20:33

So, I mean, on our website, there is an episodes page, which you can go through, and I've, we've included the description of the episode, as well as a direct link to that episode. So if I'm just going through, we talk about everything from music and our faith, Humberto and I are both very musical. And then we go to talking about, you know, what is the Church's stance on Scripture? And where do we feel that the church has strengths and areas to grow are. And we also have a couple interviews on there as

well. And I think the only episode we really have lined up solid moving forward is we're going to interview Larry McGuire, and a couple months, President of Seventy. So yeah, that's, am I missing anything, Humberto? Is there any episodes you want to want to highlight?

Humberto Tinsman 21:21

Yeah, so one of my favorite episodes that we did, it's also one of our most popular was definitely our camping episode. You know, I just come back, I think from Spectacular our Senior High Camp. So the camping experience was very, very raw. But obviously, that is something that is near and dear to many people who are in the Community of Christ heart. That has been amazing. So, you know, we've already talked about how, you know, we're having Larry McGuire come on the show, we're really excited about that. We've also interviewed David Nii, we've interviewed Mike Hoffman. So yeah, we're also just, you know, thinking of different people that might bring a different perspective, you know, answer some questions that, that we that we've always had that, you know, you're always too scared to ask an apostle, because you're intimidated. But yeah, so we've enjoyed things like that. We're sure that we're gonna probably talk more about World Conference as we get closer. And with the, with Stassi Cramm as the nominated next Prophet-President. We've talked about our reactions, and we're in our excitement and stuff like that. But, you know, that's kind of the best part about it as well is we wanted people to be able to see our journey as it progresses. So, you know, we've talked about, there are some clunkers of episodes that are there because of different technical things, or different things went wrong? Well, we keep those episodes because that's ministry, you're gonna have some times where you're gonna drop the ball, we, you know, we kind of talk it as our Ministry for Dummies moment of, you're going to make a mistake, that's important to be a part of the journey. Because if you just try to, you know, go over that and don't use that as a learning tool, you will never learn you will never grow. So yeah.

Robin Linkhart 23:04

Yeah, that's true. We're always learning right? I think that's great. Some of our very early podcasts had such terrible sound. And one of the most important ones we did early on was on Scripture. And Tony and Charmaine, Chvala-Smith. Were doing it. And we were piecing together all kinds of different equipment, and they were recording remotely, it was crazy. And that sound is like, it just makes my skin crawl, but the content is great. Okay, what?

Jacob Ross 23:37

It's all about growth.

Robin Linkhart 23:38

It's all about growth. Yes, yes. So now for a serious question. How do you sense God calling Community of Christ into the future?

Humberto Tinsman 23:50

You know, I'll go first, since Jacob is dealing with a cat, situation, you know, for, for our congregation in Albuquerque for our Mission Center here in New Mexico and the west part of Texas, the greatest sense

that I feel that God is calling the church into, is a sense of not just reconciliation, but a time of new life. You know, we are on that precipice of a brand new Prophet-President of a new World Conference, you know, that is when we, you know, as a world church, we go over those different resolutions that come from the people. So there's the sense of newness, there's a sense of rebirth, that I think you feel all the way down to the local level. And I think that's something that's incredibly exciting. You know, we've we've gotten in our congregation more conversations with those who are coming to Community of Christ from different backgrounds from either Latter Day Saint, different Latter Day Saints traditions, or people who are completely unchurched and one of their first reactions that they have is just this sense of love this sense of calling that they admit they've never experienced before, in order organized religion in our congregation. And I think that's, I think that's the challenge of we need to chase that we need to explore what that means. And you can't let that go. You know, if if you just say, Oh, that was great and 2024, we follow that love and happiness, and then you just let it slip by, you've missed that opportunity. So I think for us, and I say us as a mission field, and as a world church, it's that sense of okay, this is it. This is the moment this is the time to begin to break down those barriers and those walls and to, you know, introduce our communities to what this movement is all about, which is bringing people together under Christ and under Christ's love.

Jacob Ross 25:43

Yeah, I agree with what Humberto said, I guess for me. I think that not just our church, but the Christian faith in general, this is a time of, or it should be a time of introflection, right? Looking and self-analyzing and identifying, you know, well, these are ways that we can continue to grow. These are things that are value traditions, but are stagnated. Right, we are getting stuck, we are doing the same old things because of the same old things. And we're not maybe pursuing that with the vigor or the life that it deserves. And that will sustain us moving into the future. You know, we talked about this all the time on our podcasts, where there's not, not only is it not a lot of young people, there's not a lot of people that are like 15 years older than us, which I guess is young people if you're older than us. But there's that missing, just swath of people is just going to continue to grow, unless we do something to appeal to bring them back and identifying ways in which we can provide genuine community outside of what I would define as traditional church hours. I'm a morning person. So I don't mind getting up at nine on a Sunday, but a lot of my peers do. So how do we find other callings or other opportunities? Say, with outside organizations we can partner with or with direct ministry in our community. And I think where we are called, is to identify ways in which each congregation can have that impact on their local community. I remember when I was a kid going to church in downtown Pittsburgh, my parents would talk about how we're a commuter, not a community. And a lot of our church community commuted to that location. In fact, we had barely anybody from the neighborhood, and we had no real direct connection. And I think, what God continues to call us as a church. And I mean, I'm obviously thinking of my local congregation, as I say this is we're being called to have an impact on the people around us who need us the most.

Robin Linkhart 28:04

Thank you so much. And kind of in that same vein, what are your hopes for Community of Christ your heartfelt hopes?

Jacob Ross 28:13

I'm, I hope that it continues to grow, I hope that it's there. You know, it's no given thing. And I think that I hope that the value and the sense of community and the sense of love and well being that I have been able to get from my experience in Community of Christ propels us forward. And we're able to continue to grow and share God's calling with the people that we come into contact with.

Humberto Tinsman 28:46

You know, my hopes for Community of Christ is that we continue to invest and in some cases, like Jacob said, reinvest in our local communities. You know, it is not a it's not a far gone. situation that your congregation doesn't have a lot to do with your local community. And that breaks my heart because we need to be on the forefront of supporting local communities of supporting what our neighborhoods desire and what they need, you know, Albuquerque, like many cities across the United States has a real homeless problem. What are we doing to help that? We have a real issue with drugs a real issue with violence, both in our schools and on the streets. What are we doing to help that? And if your answer is we meet on Sundays, I again, the editors might take this out, that's not a good enough answer. We need to be doing more and we need to be asking ourselves, what are the gifts and talents that we have, that we can share with our community to show them there is a different way of life there is a chance to renew and to reengage. You know some of the most rewarding ministry I have done in my entire life. has been rehab ministry being there with people as they take those first steps into sobriety living. Some of my most rewarding ministry has been working with Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts, those community cornerstones that where the church and the community can meet. Is it stressful? Oh, yeah. Is it hard? Yes. I'm not here to tell you that. But when you see those relationships begin to form when people have an ownership of the church, not because they're members, but because they recognize it as the place where the community lives. That's exciting stuff, that stuff that will propel church's mission, mission and message into the future.

Robin Linkhart 30:45

I really appreciate that. As I'm hearing each of you talk I, there are images that come to my mind because your words are painting pictures of real life, hard life, transforming life, and just the integral connections of community that we can walk into, by walking out our doors and being with people in all the places that they are and I think we find the living Christ most when we are walking with those who are counted as least among us. I love what you say too, is we don't have to do this alone. So we are small, but there are many, many other denominations that are struggling just like we are. And partnering with those who are like minded and share our sense of call and passion to create community. And to be peacemakers allows all of us to participate in something that we can't do alone. I mean, seriously, God's call, to be peacemakers and to bring peace to not only humanity, but all creation is something that takes all of us to do. So thank you so much for painting that Vision of Hope. Is there anything that you want to say today, Humberto and Jacob that I haven't asked you about?

Jacob Ross 32:20

Um, if I ever say anything on our podcast that you feel like it's directed vaguely at you. It may be, but I did not mean it as an affront. I think that's what I would like to say, I think that everybody needs a stiff dose a dose of truth every once in a while. So you know, a lot of what I'm so passionate about is just a reminder to everybody that we need a kick in the butt to get going. Because sometimes I know like for our congregation, we struggle to get ministry outside our walls, and I need a kick in the butt too. It's not

like I'm any better than anybody else, because I'm not doing it myself. Right. So I really hope that we can continue to grow and move forward. And I think that what I'm so excited about is the fact that I think there is a hope and there is a future and a genuine place for everybody at the table as we move forward.

Humberto Tinsman 33:19

I just want to echo that as well. For all those who are listening, there is hope. There is hope for tomorrow, there is hope for Community of Christ. And we are impacting lives, we're doing the work and the mission of Christ. And I know when we're asking some hard calm, er are asking some hard questions about, you know, physical buildings and campgrounds and mission centers, and we're having to restructure some things, it can get really bleak, really, really quick. I get that and I legitimize that. But don't forget, it only takes some few vibrant witnesses to change the world. We are given that scripture for this purpose for this time, and that we are impacting lives both young like Jacob and I and those who are more seasoned. That's how I say old, more seasoned. So you know, have faith have hope. And just enjoy the journey. And try it try to focus on those brief moments of happiness because that's what makes life and ministry worth doing.

Robin Linkhart 34:22

Well from a well seasoned minister and person to a younger minister, two ministers and wonderful people.
